Farewell to our Principal

After 26 faithful years as a teacher, Vice Principal, Principal, coach and mentor, Mr. Brandsma moves on from CACHS to a new chapter in his career. We wish him and Sandra many blessings!

Here are some of his reflections on his time at CACHS.



How did you find your way to CACHS?

Upon completing my university training I found my first teaching job at Red Deer Christian School in junior high which was not my first choice, but it was a start. I had three terrific years with that school and loved the Central Alberta community, however my heart desired to teach at the secondary level in the areas of mathematics and physical education. I decided that spring to seek out employment at any Christian High School in Western Canada and had my resumes completed in envelopes ready to be sent out to Victoria, Abbotsford, Edmonton, Calgary, Lethbridge etc. I then noticed an advertisement that this very small high school just a little north of us in Red Deer was expanding to grade 12 and was looking for a high school teacher in Mathematics and Physical Education. My wife and I loved our community in Red Deer and although I was concerned about a school in portables, I really felt called to apply for this position and so all those other applications were filed away and I just applied for the CACHS position. Ella Land, Jack Vandenpol, and a few others interviewed me in the portable behind LCS, and I was very encouraged as well in being told that a new building was being put up and would be ready for the fall. I have never regretted this decision and remain thankful for the wonderful twenty-six years at the school.

How did you see the school change over the years?

Aside from growth in numbers, the school has developed a culture of excellence in a number of areas.

Academics have been a focus for our school as well as athletics and I would suggest the assembly times have been terrific as well. In addition we have created a community between the staff and students that has blessed us richly. It is like a family where the reunions have increased in size and diversity and yet remain grounded in a communal experience.

One area that has also changed is our reputation within the province. We are known through our programs in Lacombe and Ponoka in particular but also throughout the Central Zone and I would suggest the province. Good things are happening at CACHS and this is recognized in a broad context.

Describe your roles over the years.

In some ways my role has changed significantly over the years in the school, although perhaps this is more of a development. Mr. Vandenpol was an outstanding leader in encouraging and allowing each of us teachers to take leadership roles at the school. Whether this was in the development

of programs, clubs, or committees, we always felt the opportunity and encouragement to be a part of the foundation at CACHS. As our school growth happened, we were able to add staff and therefore our teaching assignments changed as well but these were minor

I entered into leadership 10 years ago as a Vice-Principal and this was a terrific training time in preparation for succeeding Mr. Vandenpol after his retirement. While this was a change, there was constancy in my time still teaching math and being an active coach during each of my years.

Are there any memories that stand out?

This is the hardest question to answer as there are so many and as I explore these times, I tend to focus on just one aspect that is not an accurate reflection of the myriad available. I will try but I apologize for those I've forgot to mention.

Students – There are so many faces and stories connected here and each year brought new ones that are such a blessing. I can still remember those first classes the most vividly, as these were foundational years for me as a teacher and also for our school. This is where the athletics programs, the assembly times, the retreat practices were developed and are highlights for me. I can recall math classes and students who excelled and struggled in my courses with equally fond memories as I always strived to make the course enjoyable.

Athletics – Volleyball in particular has brought me so much joy, not just for the championships but the relationships that grew much stronger due to the journey together. It was a blessing to be able to coach both boys and girls for many years. The girl's miracle run in the fall of 2004 at provincials where we finished with a silver medal was one I will never forget.

Worship teams – Throughout the years we have been blessed by student led worship and to this day as we sing a song, I find myself drawn back to assemblies where we learned this song. While we welcomed excellence in musical gifts, it was the "heart" of worship and service that truly touched my heart.

Staff – While I have enjoyed each and every teacher I had the pleasure to work with, there was a core group of us who worked together for many years, each with our particular skill set, yet with a common shared goal in serving the needs of our students in as many areas as possible. To be able to work together with a group of people who were selfless in their desire to bless and guide was something I will never forget. I trust that in my new school in Salmon Arm, I will once again find such a dedicated group of humble servants.

Thank you CACHS community for the twenty-six incredible years you have given me and my family. Know that you continue to be in our prayers and Sandra and I ask that you do pray for us as well.

After a few months of that, I realized I should probably be doing something else. The following September I started at Red Deer College and I spent my evenings, once again, working at McDonald's (It's hard to say no to the flexible schedule and half price food) and my summers working at a couple different greenhouses. After a few years I landed a summer job working with kids at the Ellis Bird Farm near Lacombe, which inspired me to pursue a career as a teacher.

After my first summer at the Ellis Bird Farm, I applied to the Education department at Red Deer College. I didn't mind it, but I really found myself being drawn more toward Christian education, so I transferred to The King's University the following year. There I received my Bachelor of Arts and my Bachelor of Education and met my wonderful wife, Erica:)

While Erica finished off her own Education Degree, I spent a year working at Lighthouse Christian Academy in Sylvan Lake. A few years after I started working in Fort McMurray I decided to continue my learning, so I started my Master's in Education. It was interesting trying to manage being a teacher and a student at the same time, but I was able to learn a lot and after a couple of years I earned my Master's degree! That felt like quite the accomplishment, until last year, on June 1st, when my wife gave birth to our son Reuben Albert Vanden Pol. I thought I had trouble finding balance between life and work before, but he has turned it all up on its head. I absolutely love being a father and I am excited to see him grow up, but boy is he a busy kid. Just like his dad.:)



While Reuben's birth was a wonderful blessing it did not happen quite how we had planned. On May 3rd, Erica and I were evacuated from Fort McMurray because of the wildfire. We were both at school when the call came to evacuate. Since we were together, and felt relatively safe, we stayed with our principal and a few other staff members until all the kids were picked up. We then hopped in our car and tried to head home to pick up a few things before leaving the city. After a couple hours we had only made it about a kilometer away from the school. At that point we could see flames on the horizon and were soon directed by police to head in the opposite direction and out of the city. We spent the next 3 months in Edmonton after finding out our house had been lost to the fire. It was hard to believe our home was gone, however once we got over the shock of the loss we were able to see some silver linings. We were blessed to be closer to family and have extra time together as a couple getting to know Reuben and adjusting to life as parents. We have since returned to Fort McMurray and look forward to moving back into our rebuilt home this fall.

As I look back at my years at CACHS and where my life has gone since then I am so grateful for my time and experience in high school. Being part of a Christian school my whole life has taught me to value Christian education. I have come to realize what a blessing Lacombe Christian School and CACHS are, even more so as a teacher. Both of these schools are outstanding education systems that give a great faith-based experience for all students that come into their buildings. They both do such an incredible job and are terrific examples to the rest of the Christian schools in Alberta. I know in my life, including last spring, I have needed to rely on my experiences at CACHS that helped teach me how to trust God in every circumstance. I know that as I grow in my faith, I will continue to lean on the foundation built up by my Christian schooling and I am so thankful for it.


