March 15, 2020, everything changed. The Alberta government declared a province wide school closure due to the COVID-19 pandemic. My first thought was pure joy! "No school for the next few weeks! I can hang out with my friends all the time!". The more I thought about it, the more I realized that the normal events I was looking forward to weren't going to happen as planned, like sports events, grad trip, and graduation itself. Disappointment soon overtook the joy and any other emotions I had.

March 18, 2020, was the day that the new 'normal' started. We started online education. Only seeing our teachers and classmates through a computer screen caused learning to become more difficult as teachers were less accessible and the ability to focus was decreasing by the day. Normal became sitting in front of the computer for the majority of the time, staying inside and not seeing the people you saw everyday for the past six months. Loneliness and frustration became the new pandemic among high school students, especially the Class of 2020. Talking with some of my fellow peers many of them were frustrated with online courses and being unable to have graduation the way we had planned. All we wanted was to be done with online school and to have some sort of graduation ceremony.

June 19, 2020, was the last day of the 2019-2020 school year. Again our normal was changed. We finished our 13 years of schooling with a very anticlimactic end. No Grad ceremony, no

last hurrah, no celebration. A very uneventful finish to one of the biggest accomplishments of our lives. Now discovering our new normal as high school graduates looked different for each student.

September 19, 2020, Graduation Day. As the government's COVID-19 restrictions loosened we were able to have a graduation ceremony. We adjusted to the regulations which cause us to have a limited number of guests and to have

an outdoor ceremony. It wasn't the big ceremony and banquet that we all wanted but it was something to give us a little closure to our high school careers. The class was able to see each other and make a few last memories before we moved onto different parts of our lives. Our senior year was far from the normal we expected, even though there were a few rough spots we still were able to graduate and make good memories along the way.

### **ALUMNI STORIES**

### Marieta Van Iperen

It's a typical rainy, autumn afternoon here in the Netherlands. A short two months ago I moved back here, a second time. Looking back on life since graduating in 2009 there have been so many things that I could tell you about. After High School, I attended RDC and worked at Lacombe Christian School as Educational Assistant. During that year I found that learning is a passion of mine and getting to share that with children was something I could see myself doing in the future. At a crossroads in the Spring of 2011, I decided to attend Redeemer University in Hamilton, Ontario. Graduating

with a B.A. in English and a B.Ed in 4 years finally led me to a classroom in Cambridge in the Fall of 2015. I loved teaching grade 5 but my position was only part-time. Another crossroads presented

itself choosing between teaching Kindergarten or a possible move to a new school was not easy. It wasn't easy to say no to the kindergarten position without knowing where I'd be working next. I ended

up making a dream a reality by moving back to the Netherlands - where I was born and emigrated from in 2004 - and teaching English there. I taught there for two years. In my second year, my sister Lianne (graduating class of 2011) got diagnosed with a rare cancer and went to be with Jesus ten weeks later. Her and I are the youngest in our family and my 'we'll be the last ones standing' picture got ripped to shreds. That school year was very difficult, I ended up burning out completely and going into terrible depression. It led me to decide it would be better to be in Central Alberta with my family, so I moved back in the summer of 2019. I moved away from Lacombe in 2011 and moving back was not at all the plan. But there I was, a



CACHS grad at CACHS again, and it was good. I had a great year working with and learning from my students and my own high school teachers, who were now my co-workers. I enjoyed living near my family and getting to know many people. It was a year of healing and grief and walking alongside others in their grief. In the first month of the 19/20 school year, Nathan Linker, a grade 12 student, passed away, and I was angry with God that he'd make me face death so soon and right here. I was sad that students and staff had to deal with the grief of losing a friend, classmate, or student because I knew how they felt. More and more deaths came, family and friends of staff and students. In June one of my high school classmates, Travis (TJ Tenhove), passed away in a climbing accident. We graduated in 2009; he was a young dad and married to Megan. You never expect things to change like that. Life

students who are learning English. It's a foreign language for them but they all think it's pretty cool I actually lived in Canada. Staff and students are always full of questions about life in North-America and many think I'm pretty crazy choosing rain over snow. I haven't decided yet. I teach about 155 English students and see them four times a week. One of the eight second-year classes is my homeroom class which is a lot of fun! I love that I also get to work with small groups of students on reading strategies and conversational English.

All 375 students from second to fourth year (age 13-16) will come for the small group sessions. Knowing students by first name is one of my priorities, it shows them that they're seen, valued, and known. Mostly, we try to have fun and make sure that kids aren't scared to speak English in front of others, it's a huge barrier for many!

Starting a new chapter in the Netherlands has been quite fun. I am exploring a lot of new places to visit and meeting many new people. I miss Alberta skies and wide roads but love going to the Dutch coast or seeing all the green! Friends change over the years, people move away (like me), and do their own thing. Family grows and times will be different. One thing has always been constant. All the changes that happened, moving and losing people, relationships and resumes, God remains the same. He is stable, steadfast, never changing and we can anchor our wobbly selves in Him. We can be rooted in Him and hold fast to His promises. I cling to Him in all things, through the joys and sorrows, the sunshine and the rain. It's the best place to be, in His presence here and now and one day with Him in heaven.
