PRINCIPAL'S PONDERINGS

>>> I HAD THE PRIVILEGE OF

being part of our Europe trip to Italy, Vatican City State and Greece over our Spring Break. I was blessed by the eagerness of our group members to take in the sights and lessons that each stop offered. For many in the group this was their first time in Europe, first time getting their passport stamped, first time on an overnight ferry, first time travelling without their parents, etc. Exploring the roots of our Western Civilization was a great adventure for all of us.



Many moments along the trip stand out as exceptional, but walking through the Vatican museums and grounds was a compelling experience. It was incredible to witness and learn about Michaelangelo's mastery of painting (Sistine Chapel painting), sculpture (The Pietá), architecture (St. Peter's Basilica). Our excellent guides also explained how Emperor Nero blamed 1st Century Christians for the Great Fire of Rome, and how Nero persecuted Christians in response. Part of the persecutions included Emperor Nero having Peter the Apostle crucified upside down in the Circus of Nero, which was on the same ground that St. Peter's Basilica now stands.

Our Vatican guides were clear about the great achievements of Christianity, but also the challenges humanity faces because of those that grossly misused the name of Jesus and the church to dominate distant people and lands. We left Vatican City State with much to ponder, and maybe a picture of a car that the pope was in!

A lot of effort and resources goes into these educational journeys, and they are wonderful experiences that we can offer our students. We are already beginning to make plans for our next Europe trip which will take place during our 2025-26 Spring Break. We look forward to another international trip where students can have their worldviews expanded and challenged during their educational journey with our Christian teachers.


Track and Field

Our second day, we got a taste of Roman rain, soaking us to the bone and postponing our visit of the Colosseum and the Roman Forum until the evening, which was a blessing in disguise, as the sunset and warm weather were a wonderful accompaniment to our guide through the famous landmarks. After lunch we visited a local store that had many, many flavours of olive oil and balsamic creams. After having our fill of bread and oils, we shopped for a while and then made our way to the Archimedes' Museum, where we had a quick tour of the many inventions inside.

Beautiful sunny weather welcomed us as we got off the ferry at around 1pm and the open green landscape of orchards and vineyards was a wonderful view as we drove for 2 hours to Olympia. Once we reached our hotel, we had an evening devotional for Easter on the beach, and most of us went in the sea for a swim in the cold water.




